
Fairfield County Leadership Council 2018 Year in Review

April – April belonged to "the Sheilas." Sheila Clancy and Sheila Sullivan graciously hosted our 2nd annual fundraising luncheon at the Brooklawn County Club. Guests gathered to learn about our *Return to Learning Fund* - our bold aim to ensure that every refugee child is back in an educational setting within 30

days of being displaced from their homes. Save the Children's own Maha Karahmad, a Syrian refugee, joined and shared her personal stories about life on the move. We also had a surprise guest in Deo Byakisaka, a Congolese native, who told the crowd about his daughter, who was educated in a refugee camp by Save the Children and was just accepted to Smith College!

May – We were happy to invite Council members back to our office, this time to hear Sara Hommel present our signature program Healing and Education through the Arts (HEART). It was an intimate discussion with very active Q&A. Sara was touched by the level of keen interest in social and emotional healing for children, things that are too often forgotten in times of emergency and crisis.
